Alberto Manguel is an Argentinian-Canadian writer, translator, editor and critic, born in Buenos Aires in 1948. He has published several novels, and non-fiction, including *Fabulous Monsters, Packing My Library, Curiosity, With Borges, A History of Reading, The Library at Night* and (together with Gianni Guadalupi) *The Dictionary of Imaginary Places.* He has received numerous international awards, among others the Commander of the Order of Arts & Letters from France, the Formentor Prize and the Alfonso Reyes Prize in 2017, and the Gutenberg Prize 2018. He is doctor *honoris causa* of the universities of Ottawa and York in Canada, and Liège in Belgium and Anglia Ruskin in Cambridge, UK. Until August of 2018 he was the director of the National Library of Argentina. He lives in Lisbon.

Sarah Moses's translations and poems have appeared in journals, anthologies, and chapbooks, both in Canada and abroad. Her co-translation of Ariana Harwicz's novella, *Die My Love*, was longlisted for the Man Booker International Prize, among other honours, and her second full-length translation, *Tender is the Flesh*, by Agustina Bazterrica, is forthcoming from Pushkin Press. Sarah holds an Honours B.Sc. in Biology from McMaster University and studied science writing

The Bossale Civilisation, first published in 1978, is as relevant today as when it first appeared. It illumines History as to its calculated falsehoods, and the persistence, through care and attentiveness, of what can only be qualified as the Truth. The Bossale is the African slave deported by the Atlantic Slave Trade into the plantations of Martinique and Guadeloupe, and who, from out ofhis and her struggles, sufferings and hopes, will create an entire oral literature. It is through this oral literature that Maryse Condé seeks to bring out the true face of her ancestors: the Bossales.


Contributor Bio

Maryse Condé was born in Guadeloupe in 1937, the youngest of eight siblings. She earned her doctorate at Université Sorbonne Nouvelle, and taught Francophone Literature at Columbia University in New York, where she lived for many years. She has also lived in various West African countries, where she gained inspiration for her worldwide bestseller *Segu*, for which she was awarded the African Literature Prize. Condé was awarded the New Academy Prize (or "Alternative Nobel") in Literature as well as the Cino Del Duca World Award for her oeuvre. Best known as a novelist, Maryse Condé's essays are a cornerstone of her oeuvre.

Born in Montréal in 1970, Nathanaël is the author of some forty books written in French or in English, and published in Canada, the United States, Québec and France. The recipient of the Prix Alain-Grandbois (Qc), a Publishing Triangle Award (USA), and the Prix de l'Académie Claudine de Tencin (Fr), she has been awarded fellowships from the PEN American Centre, the CNL, Terre d'Arts/etc Caraïbe, and the Archives de Martinique. Nathanaël's translations include works by Édouard Glissant, Danielle Collobert, Catherine Mavrikakis and Hilda Hilst (the latter in collaboration with Rachel Gontiio Araúio).


Between February 2021 and March 2022, Ariel Gordon and Brenda Schmidt wrote a collaborative poetry manuscript, formatted like a call and response. Ariel intended to write about urban Manitoba, the city and its trees, and Brenda was to write about rural Saskatchewan and birds. Over the course of the year, the matter of place took over and the intentions branched and flew apart. They both wrote birds and trees but also moose and mushrooms, pronghorns and wild turkeys, and people making their way through it all. They wrote climate as it was manifested in drought-stressed trees and stunted crops covered in grasshoppers, in wildfires and wildfire smoke hanging over the prairies. They wrote home as they found it.

Contributor Bio

ARIEL GORDON is a Winnipeg-based author of two collections of urban-nature poetry, both of which won the Lansdowne Prize for Poetry. Gordon also co-edited the anthology *GUSH: menstrual manifestos for our times* and is the ringleader of the National Poetry Month in the Winnipeg Free Press project. Her most recent book is *TreeTalk* which was published by At Bay Press in 2020.

Brenda Schmidt was the seventh Saskatchewan Poet Laureate. Author of five books of poetry and a book of essays, her work has been nominated for a number of Saskatchewan Book Awards over the years, received the Alfred G. 

This collection is a blend of memory, fable, and trauma that examines profound moments in which the conflict might be subtle or camouflaged but the consequences are real. A Keatsian, "mansion of many apartments," the stories combine to offer a broad narrative on how the people once known as the quiet in the land have evolved, and are evolving.



Told through the voice of Nomad, who finds himself very much at odds with the land itself. Nomad slowly learns how to reconnect with his fractured history as he embraces and is embraced by the Elders and his own students. Told is crisp, spare prose, this debut novel brings forward a powerful new indigenous voice to the literary landscape.

Contributor Bio

Scott Mainprize is a Two-Spirit lawyer and university instructor who has lived across Turtle Island. Primarily working in the areas of restorative justice, criminal law, and Indigenous - colonial history, his work is grounded in the Calls to Action and focuses on understanding where we are situated in relation to our individual, and collective, reconciliation journeys. Outside of professional life, Scott enjoys the therapeutic benefits of performing stand-up comedy, and being put in his place by a wolf and her cat. Additionally, other stressors complicate his day: a) Darby's original fifth grade teacher Mr. Henderson, who had a car-accident-of-unknown-origins back in November, has died that night before, b) the class's substitute teacher Monsieur Substitute has been having an affair with his classmate Jennie's mother Vice Principal Phelps-Christianson, a secret Darby shares with former-friends-turned-dangers Alexander and Them and a secret he must hide from Jennie, and c) throughout the day, Alexander and Them threaten to beat the snot-stuffing-piss-puke out of him and threaten to expose the fact that Darby has stolen from his father's collection of vintage pornography magazines. The complications confounding Darby intensify throughout his day, culminate in a classroom scuffle, and result in a better understanding of his mom, mechanical engineering, sex, and violence.

Comic, circadian, and literary, the novel's structure alternates between chapter and composition sections: single-day chapters that trace the increasing complications of Darby's day are interspersed with composition sections that reflect and riff on Darby's worried state of mind. Taken altogether, An Unruly Little Animal offers readers a poignant and humorous coming-of-age story.

Her efforts to break free of her constricting heritage coincide with the aftermath of Quebec's Revolution of the 1960s and subsequent bloodshed and violence as the French-language majority wrests control of the province's resources from the English elite.





Cathedral/Grove, **Susan Glickman**'s brilliant new collection, comes to terms with the question of legacy--what we leave behind as a species, as citizens, and as parents. Marked by the lucidity and precision she has been celebrated for, the poems encompass the monuments of Western civilization, a climate in decline and the pandemic. The title is inspired by the fire that ravaged Notre Dame Cathedral in 2019, destroying the wooden roof-frame known as *La Forêt*; it also alludes to "Cathedral Grove," otherwise known as MacMillan Provincial Park, one of the last old growth stands on Vancouver Island. In poems of praise and lament for our fractured world--"Everything is becoming more itself / or something else," she writes--Glickman has tapped into a magnificent vein of lyric richness.

Quick Than The Eye



Whispering City

Quebec City crime reporter Mary Roberts is about to leave her desk for the day when she receives word that a woman has been struck down in the centre of town. The victim is Renée Brancourt. A former pin-up, she'd once been a big star, treading the boards at the *Comédie-Française*, until her lover, Robert Marchand, plunged over Montmorency Falls. Renée's inability to accept his death led her to be institutionalized.

Now on her deathbed at the Hôtel-Dieu Hospital, the faded *vedette* tells Mary that Robert's death was no accident. She points an accusing finger at Albert Frédéric, the most respected lawyer in the city, thus setting the young reporter on a trail that will ultimately imperil her own life.

Whispering City began as a 1947 Canadian feature shot in both English and French (*La Forteresse*). Predating Alfred Hitchcock's *I Confess* by six years, it is the earliest film noir set in Canada. In his novelization, **Horace Brown** improves upon the film, altering the dialogue, shedding its weaknesses, providing backstory, and giving flesh to its characters. The result brings tension and is a much darker noir.

First issued in 1947 by Global Publishing of Pickering, Ontario. *Whispering City* has since become one of the most sought-after Canadian pulp novels. This Ricochet Books edition marks a return to print after seventy-six years.






